REFLECTION IDEAS - HOPE

Mark chapter 10 verses 46 to 52



This GenR8 Connect looks at the importance of hope – that we need to keep hopeful about the future even when we are having tough times. Christians believe that we can all have hope in God and that he can give us a reason to hope even in the dark, difficult days. Hope can be like a light shining in the darkness.

The story in this video tells how Jesus brought hope and light to a man named Bartimaeus, who was blind and had to sit by the roadside begging in order to live. Jesus healed him and he immediately started to follow Jesus. There is also a reflection on the fact that we too can help to bring hope to others by own attitudes, words and actions.

Reflection

- How could you help someone having a bad day have hope for tomorrow?
- What can you do to be a bringer of hope and light to someone else?
- How might having hope in God help people in difficult situations?


Bartimaeus has hope in Jesus – Bible story

Cut out and colour the pictures on the next page, sticking them next to the right part of the story.


1. About 2000 years ago a boy called
Bartimaeus was born blind. When he grew
up he could not see to work, so he sat by the
road waiting for people to give him money
so that he could buy food. Life was hard for
Bartimaeus.
2. One day lots of people were coming past
with Jesus. Bartimaeus knew Jesus could
heal people so he called out 'Jesus please
help me'.
Some people told him, 'Be quiet, Jesus is too
busy to help you'.
3. Jesus always hears when we ask for help.
He heard Bartimaeus and asked to speak to
him. Bartimaeus had hope that Jesus could
help him
4. Jesus asked Bartimaeus, 'What do you
want me to do for you?'
'I want to be able to see,' said Bartimaeus.
Then a miracle happened!
5. Jesus made Bartimaeus see, and the first
thing he saw was Jesus! Bartimaeus was so
happy, he thanked Jesus and told everyone
what Jesus had done for him. He had been
right to have hope in Jesus.





In the video, candles are used as a symbol of hope. Cut out the candle template and colour in the candle, flame and letters. . You could decorate your hope candles with shiny stickers or other bright things.

Fold the body of the candle round into a tube and stick it together so your candle can stand up.

Rainbows were used as a symbol of hope during the early days of the pandemic, as they often appear when the sun comes out after a heavy rainfall, which helps to remind us that there is always hope and light even after difficult times.



Use washable pens to draw a rainbow on a flattened out coffee filter or on thick paper towel. Spritz the paper with water and watch as the colour spreads to fill in the gaps.

Alternatively use half a paper plate to create rainbows using paints.
