

DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

This morning I had a Facebook notice to say it was my nephew's birthday. My first thought was, does he have two? It only seems like a few weeks ago since his last birthday! You won't need me to say that the past year has been a strange one, punctuated by shafts of light shining out of often bleak and difficult times. A year where normal has gone out of the window, and time seems to have stood still, yet raced by simultaneously! Where has the year gone?

At times I have looked back over the year and thought what have we achieved? Being unable to run several of our usual initiatives and activities, whilst trying to establish new routines in the midst of constant change, has at times proved frustrating and tiring. YET... we have kept regular contact with well over 100 primary schools through

our Connect and Reflect videos; we have provided adapted resources for Inspire Prayer Spaces, Permanent Prayer Spaces, and It's Your Move; and we managed to run an online Xcellr8 weekend, to

name but a few key accomplishments.

In addition, 2021 ended with us being able to lead a few 'trial' Cool Choices sessions with Year 6 students, as well as 35 'Advent' themed assembly presentations in person. How good it was to be welcomed back into schools so warmly and to see smiling children participating and listening so brilliantly. The teams were a little nervous after a 20-month absence, but it didn't take long to get into the swing, and as one team member commented after the last school had been visited: 'It made me remember why I love doing GenR8 so much.'

SCHOOLS WORK

GENR8 'ASSEMBLY' PRESENTATIONS IN 2021

GenR8 Connect

For most of 2021 we were sadly unable to go into schools to do in-person assemblies. Instead, Steve and the team of many volunteers continued to produce regular 'GenR8 Connect' videos for schools to use in collective worship and RE. The over-arching theme for these 10-15



minute videos in 2021 was 'Life Lessons', exploring what Christians believe the Bible teaches about how we should live, and the positive impact that Jesus can have on our lives. Each was based around a bible story or theme, featured an introduction from the local team filmed on Zoom, puppets or a linked illustration, and ended with a time of reflection that encouraged the children to think about how what they had heard could impact their lives.



Making the videos required the large number of volunteers who would normally visit schools to spend many hours on Zoom, but the results enabled the connection between schools and their 'local' team to be maintained in some way. Many volunteers were also involved in the storytelling, puppets, illustrations, links and reflections that made up these videos. A summary of the 'Life Lessons' covered is in the table.

Unexpected Easter

At Easter we took the opportunity provided by video presentations to cover many more of the events of Holy Week than is normally possible in a single live assembly. Three videos under the title 'Unexpected Easter' were produced. In the first, Jan told the story of Jesus' entry to Jerusalem on Palm Sunday as an eyewitness account of someone who had been there when young. It was unexpected that Jesus, who had done amazing miracles and was being called a king by some, should look so normal and be riding on a donkey! The second video looked at the events of the Last Supper, and as the story was told, Revd Kate Lees explained some of the unexpected events in more depth – the origins



of the Passover, the significance of Jesus washing his disciples' feet, the betrayal by Judas and the institution of the Communion meal. A Roman centurion (aka David) described the events of Jesus' arrest and trial, Good Friday and Easter Sunday from his viewpoint. He marvelled at the unexpected choice of the crowd to free Barabbas and call for Jesus to be crucified; the unexpected attitude and words of Jesus on the cross, to care for and forgive others; and the unexpected empty tomb and reports of Jesus being alive.



Each of the 'Connect' style videos began with a humorous introduction

from the local team and finished with a chance to reflect on what Christians believe about the events described and how we might respond. It was great to be able to look at Easter in more depth than usual and we hope that the videos will be a resource that schools can continue to use in years to come.



Advent

Teams were excited to be able to offer 'live' assemblies in the run up to Christmas. The presentation chosen focussed on Advent and what it means to get ready for Jesus (based on a script by Amy Robinson). The team and puppets discovered that it is really important to know what you are getting ready for. The Bible story looked at John the Baptist as he told the people to get ready for Jesus by changing their behaviour and turning to Him. Following Jesus means being prepared to help others in need, as described in our song, 'Jesus went out of his way', by John Hardwick. At the end of the presentation children were challenged to think about what Jesus was like when he came to earth, and why he did so.





Despite continued Covid restrictions meaning many schools were not able to welcome teams in person, some having to cancel at the last moment, a total of 29 schools were visited with this message. A video of the presentation was made and circulated to all schools, so no-one had to miss out.

All of the presentations were accompanied by supporting material for teachers, including video links, questions for further reflection, a prayer space idea and activities to help recall the bible story and the messages shared. INSPIRE PRAYER SPACES

Reflect Videos





Over the last year, 14 Reflect videos have been produced (4 in Spring term, 5 in Summer term and 5 in Autumn term) on a wide range of topics. Diversity, resilience, joy and kindness are some of the themes looked at, as well as topics like reducing single-use plastics and overcoming the challenges we face. Each video is about 5 minutes long and is based on prayer space ideas, giving children the opportunity to pause, reflect, think and the chance to pray, if they choose to. Each short reflection video can be used an act of collective worship in classes or in larger groups.

Toppling Temptation had a Lent focus and looked at the period of time when Jesus was tempted in the desert. Siân, Iris and Bev asked those watching if they had chosen to give something up for Lent - maybe chocolates or fizzy drinks, and then to think about what tempts them using unkind words, thinking of yourself before thinking of others, to give up when something is difficult, or something else. Siân explained that when Jesus went into the desert, he fasted and was tempted to turn stones into bread! Holding a stone, children are asked to think about those things they are tempted by and how tricky it is to say 'no' and not to do them. A prayer at the end thanked God because he is always with us, helping us to say 'no' when we are tempted.





Bouncing Back encouraged those watching to be resilient. Siân and Iris talked about how resilience means the ability to 'bounce back' when life knocks you down, like a sponge has the ability to expand and retain its shape after being squashed down! The video contained time for children to think about something that has 'knocked them down' recently, e.g. falling out with a friend, problems at home, or not doing as well in a test as they would have liked. Siân explained that to help us get back up, we need something that's going to encourage, strengthen and build us up and as Christians, we look to God for this strength and encouragement. After sharing a prayer, children were invited to bounce a ball in response, reflecting on what knocks them down and what encourages them and gives them the strength to bounce back.

Producing these videos on a regular basis has become a feature of each term and we hope that they will continue to be a useful, informative and thought-provoking bank of resources for schools to use. These videos can be found at: www.genr8.org/prayer-spaces

Permanent Prayer Spaces

The Permanent Prayer Space project is now in its fifth year and we continued to support nine schools with materials in 2021. Schools involved in the project stretch



across South Cambs and range from very small schools to much larger ones. Those signed up are: Elsworth, Wilburton, Oakington, Dry Drayton, Barton, Great and Little Shelford, Babraham, Abbots Ripton and Fordham Primary Schools. We were able to maintain good links throughout the year with the school staff and the church volunteers connected with these schools.

We also continued to adapt activities and display materials to allow schools a wide choice of new resources, changing every 4-6 weeks. Themes throughout the year included love and compassion, Pentecost, change and growth, and remembrance. We made sure each display was Covid-safe and didn't require children to touch pencils, paper, ribbons and other resources. Despite access to school being restricted, school staff have been very appreciative that Permanent Prayer Spaces has kept going as can be seen from the comments!

For Autumn Term, we moved back to delivering each theme to the local church volunteer and offered schools a more interactive and hands-on prayer space activity (similar to pre-pandemic support). Schools have then been able to make



Special thanks to Janet King for continuing to distribute, support schools and liaise with local church volunteers throughout 2021, ensuring the project continues and children in these schools have access to a prayer space. Thank you, Janet!

IT'S YOUR MOVE AND TRANSITION PRAYER BAGS

During the Summer Term, GenR8 once again sent out the *It's Your Move* video produced in 2020 to all schools in our area for use with Year 6 moving up to secondary school. The video features many of the elements that would take place during an in-person visit, including the phobia challenge, chill line and discussion of dilemmas, all predominantly led by young people in Years 11, 12 and 13. Schools received a link to the video as well as a teachers pack with guidance for running the workshop. The video is



designed to be used alongside the Scripture Union *It's Your Move* books, which were kindly donated by local churches.

Because schools were still limiting visitors and an in-person *It's Your Move* tour wasn't able to take place, GenR8 offered some schools the opportunity to have an Inspire Transition Prayer Space bag for each of their Year 6 pupils. This is an individual drawstring bag for each child to keep, containing six items. Each one of these items was linked to a prayer space activity, each one giving pupils the opportunity to pause and reflect on their time at primary school and think about some of the challenges they may face as they move onto secondary. The bags also included instructions for each activity, plus we produced a video introducing the bags and explaining how to use them. In total 17 schools took us up on the offer, so just over 450 children received one of these prayer bags.

Putting these bags together was a large project and involved many volunteers. At times it felt like a small army was cutting fabric, sewing panels together, threading string, filling with the items and delivering to schools! Thank you to everybody that has supported this project in prayer, donated their time and/or sewing thread to enable this to happen.

Our Year 6 children thoroughly enjoyed working through the activities at their own pace. It's clear that a huge amount of work went into producing these (including sourcing the materials, making the videos and making the bags). We found them very helpful, inspiring and relaxing. Thanks to everybody involved. Year 6 teacher







VOLUNTEER VIEWS - Telling God's Story

COOL CHOICES 2021

Cool Choices encourages children to think more deeply about choices they might have to make in later life and gives children an opportunity to see how Christians make life choices by looking to God.



Should we or shouldn't we? That was the question in early September as we grappled with whether to offer schools Cool Choice sessions for their Year 6 students. Eventually we decided to put our toes in the water and approach three schools with which we have very good relationships to offer Covid-safe sessions. All three schools responded positively, and we prepared and reshaped our session activities to suit, including the introduction of our version of 'Carrot in a Box' (See '8 out of 10 cats does Countdown!')

Here's what Bev said about leading one of the sessions alongside David:

David and I had such a good morning sharing Cool Choices with 17 Year 6 children. From the moment we introduced ourselves we enjoyed working with a very interactive, engaged group of children and encouraging them to explore the importance of making cool choices and how they can affect their lives. That face-to-face interaction really makes Cool Choices a full-on morning!

All three sessions gave the team a really positive and safe experience. As well loving being back in schools we were all impressed and encouraged by the participation and engagement from the Year 6 students.

VOLUNTEER VIEWS - Reflections from a 'Veteran Volunteer'

Trustee Perspective



My name is Penny Kite, and my first involvement with GenR8 was meeting Steve and a small team who came to take an assembly in my school (Barton Primary) in about 2001. I was really surprised and delighted by the presentation, because it seemed quite light-hearted and yet clearly showed the pupils how Jesus was relevant to them. Most children in primary schools do not go to any place of worship themselves, and have no idea that faith can be personal and precious.

Thinking that other teachers might benefit from some support material that was designed to follow up these visits, from summer 2002 and for the next 13 years, I wrote some light-hearted worksheets on behalf of GenR8, playing a small part in the 'relevance' link for schoolchildren, and indeed for their teachers.

When Steve Whyatt left Scripture Union and became employed by GenR8, I became a trustee, but only stayed for a year in that post, due to family commitments. However, I have continued to support GenR8, watching the work growing around the county and beyond, and re-joined the team this year. As I moved on to Foxton Primary School, I was able to enjoy many of the presentations from the audience perspective, and was heartened to discover how much the pupils looked forwards to the visits, and welcomed the team.

I have been a member of Great Shelford Free Church since 1976, participating in children's work of various kinds, and have been so impressed with the range of outreach that GenR8 performs, from assembly presentations to prayer spaces, from Xcellr8 (the annual residential weekend for 8-11 year olds) to 'Cool Choices', the teams show a degree of love and commitment, combined with presentational excellence, which is compelling.

During the pandemic, GenR8 has shown itself (along with all primary school workers) to be brilliantly flexible, and has taken to video presentations like a proverbial duck to water, taking seriously the command of Jesus to let children come to him, and that of Paul in his letter to the Romans:

'But how can people call for help if they don't know who to trust? And how can they know who to trust if they haven't heard of the One who can be trusted? And how can they hear if nobody tells them?' (Romans 10:14 – 17, The Message) That is what we do.



GenR8's Objectives


- To present the Christian faith to primary school age children in partnership with local churches and Christian volunteers.

For the financial year 2020-2021, the total income was £61,043 (down from £82,374 in the previous year). This was as expected due to the Covid restrictions that took effect at the start of this accounting period. Donations from individuals were only slightly affected, for which we are very grateful. Donations from churches actually increased, but unsurprisingly donations from schools dropped to almost zero as we weren't able to visit any schools. Also, the income associated with events such as XcellR8 and projects such as Inspire Prayer Spaces dropped significantly.

Some of our associated costs were also reduced by not visiting schools, making the total expenditure £58,618 (down from £63,206 in the previous year).

During the current financial year, started in April 2021, things have carried on in a similar way with just a small further drop in donations from individuals. And now that we have started getting back into schools, we expect some of the other revenue streams to pick up again.

If you don't do so already, could you consider making a regular donation to GenR8?

Even a small amount on a monthly or quarterly basis would help us to plan for the future and continue the work.

It has been a privilege to support all the good work you do in schools in Cambridge and around Royston, where we live. I have enjoyed reading about it all in the newsletters.
