REFLECTION IDEAS

Christmas Hope

Luke 1:26-38; Luke 2:1-20; Matthew 1:18-25; Matthew 12:21

This presentation looks at the Christmas narrative found in the Bible and the Christian belief that Jesus was God's son and was born to bring hope to the world. The story is told from the perspective of the angels and focuses on what each of the characters in the Christmas story were hoping for.

The word 'angel' comes from the Greek *angelos*, meaning messenger and angels are very much part of the Christmas story in Matthew and Luke; telling Mary she will have a baby, reassuring Joseph that he should still marry Mary as her baby was from the Holy Spirit, and announcing the birth of Jesus to the shepherds outside Bethlehem.

Questions for reflection

- What are you hoping for this Christmas?
- Why do Christians see Jesus as hope?
- If God sent an angel or messenger to the world today, they would probably say "Don't be afraid!" but what else do you think their message might be? Would they bring a message of hope and encouragement or a warning about things that need changing in the world?

Here are some ideas of how other people have imagined angels to be.

- 1. 'An Angel Just Like Me', a book by Mary Hoffman, illustrated by Cornelius Van Wright and Ying-Hwa Hu.
- 2. 'The Angel of the North', a sculpture by Anthony Gormley which stands in Gateshead. It weighs 200 tons and is the size of a Jumbo Jet, which makes it the largest piece of public art in Britain.
- 3. Mosaic of an angel from the Hagia Sofia in Istanbul thought to be over 700 years old.
- **4.** 'The Annunciation', painted by Jan Van Eyck in 1434-1436. The picture shows the angel Gabriel speaking to Mary about the birth of Jesus.
- 5. 'Angel', a screenprint by Keith Haring made in 1990.









Did you know?

The name Gabriel means 'God's Hero' and he is seen as God's special messenger angel; on several occasions in the Bible he is given the job of coming to earth to give important announcements and tell of special events.
