A song from Fischy Music, The Angels Say, was particularly enjoyed by schools and the team alike, and included the words 'don't be afraid, the angels say'. We ended with a reflection on why Jesus came and the hope that he can bring to us all, not just at Christmas, but in our lives each day.

## Volunteer Views - Reflections of a retiring volunteer – Jane Farewell

I have been involved with the work of GenR8 for 20 years, visiting local primary schools three times a year and sharing the good news of the gospel with 1000s of children. Drama, puppets, singing, interacting with the other team members, the children and teachers, I have so enjoyed it all! But I now feel it is time to retire! It has been a very hard decision!

I would like to tell you about our last assembly tour which finished mid-December 2023. Five GenR8 teams visited 122

Primary Schools (mostly in Cambridgeshire) and between us we saw over 30,000 children (not counting any teachers!) Our theme was Jesus the Hope of the world. The Central team, of which I was a part, gave 26 assemblies, lasting 25 minutes, over 6 days. Most of those days we visited 4 or 5 schools and we saw almost 6,000 children! I can hardly describe the incredible joy I felt standing in front of those children telling them of God's love for them; to see the faces of so many that keenly listened and joined in with the song that we taught them was amazing! On our last day we were down one team member who was unwell and, if anything, the joy was even greater because it was evident that we were being upheld by prayer and God's grace. It has been an incredible privilege to be part of this organisation, in which I hope to stay involved, though perhaps not so physically! GenR8 continues to need new people to volunteer and my overarching prayer is that boys and girls, and teachers too, will put their faith and trust in The Lord Jesus.



## AFFILIATE TEAM - West Norfolk team update

Looking back to our report at the beginning of last year, we had undergone quite a few changes having lost two key members of our W. Norfolk team. I am very pleased to report that 2023 was a much more 'stable' year.

## Volunteer Views - The Joys of being a Booking Coordinator - Dianne Conway

Booking coordinators are responsible for contacting the schools with tour dates, receiving the email replies, and then arranging the timetable for their team so that the team can travel quickly between schools to deliver 4 or 5 assemblies each tour day. Just before each tour day, the booking coordinator emails the schools a reminder and then after the visit they send a thank you message with details of options for donations towards travel costs.

Between assembly tours the booking coordinator sends details of the Reflect and Connect videos to the schools.

As a retired teacher it has been a joy to maintain contacts with local schools and establish good relationships with head teachers and school secretaries. I am always amazed that many busy head teachers have time to reply very quickly once the booking email arrives, often within minutes, with greetings such as 'I was hoping you would be able to come again this term' or just 'Great!' Some head teachers follow up the assembly with lovely positive feedback.

Over the 20 years of booking I have wished many heads good luck as they move schools or retire to spend time with grandchildren or pursue a different path. Then the task is to establish a good relationship with the new head. On one occasion a message of support following a fire which destroyed part of the school was much appreciated. Another head was grateful for our response to a panic email on the day before the assembly: 'Just heard we have OFSTED tomorrow, do you want to cancel?' 'No of course not!'; the Ofsted inspector watched part of the assembly.

## **Connect and Reflect Videos**

Connect videos are now a part of our ministry to schools and could be used by churches too. This year we have updated several of the videos that were produced during the pandemic by re-filming sections or revising content that was specific for those times. We now have a resource bank of 28 Connect videos on various themes, including several stories from the Old Testament, such as *New starts and changes* using the story of Joseph, *I can do it* with the story of Gideon, and *Facing Giants* with David and Goliath. There are also New Testament parables such as *You are precious* with the parable of the lost sheep and *Who is my neighbour?* focusing on the Good Samaritan story. We added to our series of Jesus the ... videos in 2023 with new ones on the life of Jesus – including *Jesus the miracle worker* and *Jesus the role model*. As well as the Connect videos we also have 21 of the 5-minute Reflect videos on our website – giving children an opportunity to pause and think with topics such as justice, diversity, resilience, and peace.

At the beginning of each term, we have highlighted a small number of Connect and Reflect video titles to all the primary schools that we have contact with, although they also can access our whole library via searchable tables on our website. We are delighted that many schools are still using these videos and are appreciative of the accompanying reflection and activity sheets too. Who would have thought that the pandemic would bring out so much talent in our volunteer team, and so much creativity too!

#### **INSPIRE PRAYER SPACES**

### Permanent Prayer Spaces



In our 2022 Review we stated that we were looking to expand our provision of Permanent Prayer Spaces and are excited that we now support three additional schools to make a total of twelve schools. These

spaces range from a chair to a display board - the materials are very flexible and adaptable! Themes change every 46 weeks and over the last year have included Lent and Easter, Celebrations, Growing and Changing, and Remembrance. In all the schools we have built good relationships with school staff and the local church volunteers, who liaise with the school about putting up each new display. This project couldn't continue without the support of all these volunteers faithfully putting up new displays, talking to the children and staff about the new themes, and passing on information to the wider church body.

Many thanks to Janet King for her role in the Permanent Prayer Space project: supporting a number of schools, delivering the display items and generally collaborating with Siân when thinking of new theme ideas. Janet says:

'Why is this permanent prayer space project important to me?

This creates a small, sacred space in a school where children (and visitors and staff) can visit, observe, take time out, think, reflect, maybe even pray.

It's a way of providing regular Christian input to a variety of community and church schools. The conversations, practical support with displays and free resources are a blessing to weary teachers.

It's a way of developing and strengthening links between schools and their local churches. Some volunteers put up displays in the churches too.

It's a way of showing children that God is interested in their everyday lives!'

## Inspire Prayer Space days



This year we held our first outdoor prayer space, for children in Years 5 and 6. The day featured blowing our worries away in the form of bubbles; making a 'muddy mess' reminding us that things are not always easy; and listening and

appreciating God through the sounds of nature. 120 children visited the space over one day in May with comments such as:

'I liked the activity where you had to listen. I heard so many sounds!'

'I made a big muddy mess with the mud and it helped me as sometimes I get things wrong.'

'This space feels so calm and relaxing.'

Your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Matthew 6:10 Inspire Prayer Spaces happened in seven primary schools across Cambridgeshire in 2023 – Steeple Morden CofE, Alconbury CofE, Hatton Park (Longstanton), William Westley CofE (Whittlesford), Barton CofE, Guilden Morden CofE and Kennett. For six of these schools it was the first time they had experienced a prayer space and all were supported in some way by local churches. Most had a general theme around prayer with activities focusing on ourselves, others, the wider world and God.







We also took Inspire Prayer Spaces to Make Lunch Royston three times in 2023 – in February half term, in the summer holiday and in October half term. Make Lunch is a programme providing healthy hot meals in the school holidays to families who normally receive free school meals. Families are fed and then they all have some time to explore the prayer space.

This was a very different experience for those of us on the Inspire team as we had a range of children and young people visiting, some with their parents and some without, some staying for a long time and some just putting their heads round the door! We had lots of conversations with the families, emphasising to us how prayer spaces can be intergenerational and can work well in non-school settings. Louise Bradley, Make Lunch Royston coordinator, says:

'It was wonderful to have the Inspire team at our Make Lunch sessions during 2022. We have been so impressed with the range of thoughtful activities the team has brought to Make Lunch and especially how the team have adapted the activities over time to fit with their interests, and attention span! The children are always excited to see the Inspire team at our sessions and I've had lots of lovely comments from children and parents about the activities.'

One of the visits to Make Lunch led to Inspire Prayer Spaces visiting Royston Methodist Church coffee morning one Saturday in November. We set up a prayer space in exactly the same way we would in a school and had many conversations with the community about how prayer spaces can support schools in so many different ways: supporting children's learning in RE lessons about Christianity, helping them to develop spiritual curiosity as part of the spiritual, moral, social and cultural development (SMSC) as well as making links to mental health and wellbeing.

GenR8 are part of the regional network of Prayer Spaces in Schools who assist smaller groups, like GenR8, with the running of prayer spaces across the UK. Over the year we have been brilliantly supported by the team who have hosted regional network meetings, training sessions on a variety of different topics and much needed encouragement via email.



In February, Siân was interviewed for Prayer Space Session #16 Permanent Prayer Spaces, a Zoom meeting where we had the opportunity to tell others how Permanent Prayer Spaces operates in Cambridgeshire. ## IT'S YOUR MOVE AND TRANSITION PRAYER BAGS

For a week in July, eleven young people together with Siân and Steve, took the It's Your Move workshop to 14 schools across Cambridgeshire reaching 428 children. We explored how the Year 6 children will face changes, challenges and choices at secondary school through doing a phobia challenge, chill line and discussions of dilemmas they may face. We listened to their worries and offered support from those in the team who have recently been through a transition of their own, encouraging them that they will not only survive the experience, but they will thrive!

As in previous years, all children received a copy of the It's Your Move book, produced by Scripture Union, after the workshop along with a prayer bag. Books were often donated by local churches as a gift to the pupils and it was really encouraging for the team when members of the church family could be there at the workshop too – we were joined in person at eight schools. Along with the books, pupils received a prayer bag, similar to previous years containing six items each linked to a prayer space activity. The activities gave children the opportunity to reflect on some of the themes covered in the workshop and a chance to process their thoughts and feelings associated with leaving primary school and the transition to secondary. Bags were sewn and filled by some of our supporters, many of whom have been involved since the beginning when we were in lockdown 2020!



Thank you very much to those who helped with the prayer bags and to those who drove us around for this week (and those on standby too). As we had 11 young people join us, some days we needed three cars!

We shared our top tips, rapped the story of Joseph, had games, and got the Year 6s in our small groups talking about their worries. I think that they were much more likely to talk to us, who had just been through secondary school, and we could relate to them more easily. I think they had a great time and now they're hopefully not as worried about the move ! AL – IYM team member

#### **COOL CHOICES**

In 2023 GenR8 led 41 Cool Choices workshops in 35 primary schools.

We all make choices, sometimes 100s in a day, but as well as those small choices what about some of life's big choices? Can our choices today affect tomorrow? What are the

ripples of our choices? Do they just affect us, or do they have an impact on others, and what our world is like? These are just some of the things we think about during our Cool Choices workshops as we spend time reflecting on choices with the aim of supporting young people in making positive life choices.

Those who have led our GenR8 workshops over the last year are Bev Thomas, David Newton, Paul Brown, Liz Jenkin, Siân Thorne, and Steve Whyatt. We have also led some sessions in partnership with Jennifer Musson of Actios; Actios, like GenR8, are a local Scripture Union mission partner based in St Neots. It's been great to work together in primary schools where we both have an active Christian presence.

Here's what Bev had to say about being part of our Cool Choices team in 2023 and the impact it has on the Year 6 students...

'It was great to be on the Cool Choices team again in September and this time I had the pleasure of working with both Siân and Steve as we paired up for a very full schedule! This two-hour workshop with so many different activities, videos, and opportunities for Year 6s to engage and interact is so exciting to present. It's

brilliant to see a whole class think more deeply about Choice, Consequences, and Influences — they gradually open up, share, and have fun too. It's also a privilege to share how being a Christian gives us a strong foundation as we face those big choices in life. I was so struck by how thoughtful, positive, and encouraged the children were after each session — we certainly leave them with a lot to think about and put into action!'

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I am always very aware that we are in such a privileged position to sow seeds of interest and curiosity in the minds of our children. We pray God waters those seeds and in time our young people are reminded of words and thoughts from occasions such as today – and are then inspired to make those 'Cool Choices!' May you be blessed in all that you do in supporting our schools. Headteacher

## VOLUNTEER VIEWS - a visiting trustee's perspective - Penny Kite

I visited a primary school north of Huntingdon towards the end of September, to watch two of the GenR8 team deliver a programme called 'Cool Choices'. I had never seen the programme and only had the vaguest idea what to expect. We were shown into a Year 6 classroom, where the teacher had already organised the clearing of furniture, and the pupils sat around the edge expectantly. The session began.

Frankly, I was astonished. The programme, designed to help pupils to consider how to make good decisions, neither preached nor cajoled. The GenR8 team accepted suggestions without any sign of concern, however difficult the subject matter that arose: they had already heard that answer; dealt with that behaviour. They were kind, courteous and encouraging. The class teacher remained in the room and sometimes joined in with an activity, showing that he both valued and enjoyed the session.

The session consisted of a series of interesting activities, that were fun to participate in, without the pressure of being required to give a personal opinion – though most children did. The team explained that choices could be small and relatively unimportant (whether you prefer crisps or chocolate) or have long term significance (whether you choose to start smoking or vaping). In groups of 5 or 6, pupils were encouraged to consider six Life Choices and then to work together to agree a ranking. Some of the choices that pupils suggested were what I had expected, like whether to have a pet, to get married, to move house. Some were not: to choose their gender, to have plastic surgery, to commit suicide. Someone wanted to know what suicide is and this was explained briefly, calmly and without emphasis; I was stunned. The topics that occasioned most discussion related to education (maths is good for counting, paying bills and getting a job) and the law (don't break it) and, sadly, ecology was barely mentioned.

There were short video clips from various sources, including Harry Potter, rôle plays that helped the 'audience' both to watch and comment upon everyday social issues for Year 6 children such as being talked about by others on social media, being persuaded to watch an 18-rated video, or being left out of a group. Pupils were consistently encouraged to be brave and ask questions, ask for help, make cool choices.

After a break, pupils returned to consider how all our choices are affected by advertising, with companies paying an average of seven million U.S. dollars to air a 30-second commercial during the Super Bowl LVI broadcast in 2023! They considered the influence of celebrities, the internet and religion, thinking carefully about how these things can be used positively or negatively, and suggesting their reasons. Then they considered the influence of friends and discovered through a rôle play that even friends can be untruthful yet credible.

The team told the children a little about Nic Vujicic, born without arms or legs, who wanted to give up on living, but became a Christian and now travels the world sharing his faith. He is an antibullying ambassador with an inspirational message. Then a video account of the parable of the two builders showed how Christians believe that Jesus is the foundation of their lives, and the



team simply asked pupils to consider the foundation of their own lives. Finally, reflection stations gave pupils the chance to think again about Cool Choices – ones that provide good outcomes for themselves, for others and for the world.

As Rob Parsons said, 'Every choice you make today, makes up the person you will be tomorrow.'

I was so proud to watch the team in action, amazed at the professional session that they had delivered, and profoundly thankful to God for the work of GenR8.

## **GROWING YOUNG DISCIPLES**

Siân Thorne, GenR8 Director, and Nicola Grieves, Children and Youth Development Officer for the URC, ran a Growing Young Disciples day on a Saturday in November. The day was based on the book Surprise the World! by Michael Frost and we looked to encourage the young people in

## **FINANCES**



Where do our finances come from?

The total income for the year that ended in March 2023 was £62,387 (slightly down on the previous year). Donations from individuals dropped somewhat but gifts from churches and schools increased noticeably compared to the previous year.

Expenditure increased to £75,426 for the year (compared to £67,134 in the previous year). The increase was mostly due to staff costs and expenditure on travel and resources for schools work.

So far during the current financial year (to March 2024) expenditure has been lower and we are running at close to breakeven. But we could still do with some fresh sources of income, so if you, your friends or your church could help out, please get in touch.

# **CHURCH SERVICES & EVENTS**

In 2023 we were invited to visit Christ Church, Huntingdon in March, Melbourn Baptist Church in August, and Linton Free Church in September – all to take an all-age service. 'Experience Easter' was another opportunity to support a church in their relationship with the local school. Siân worked together with local church volunteers to put on the day for KS2 to walk through the events of Easter and engage with the story in an interactive way.
